

Organizing a Crossword Contest

There are many ways to organize a contest in and out of the classroom. For National French Week, the objective is to organize a competition outside the French classroom, but either option will show students how closely French is related to English and how much general knowledge relates to French.

The puzzle itself is 43 squares wide by 44 squares long. Students can draw four-inch squares on rolls of paper to create a wall-sized grid and fill them in and number them to match the blank puzzle. Smaller copies of grids can also be distributed for students to compete in teams.

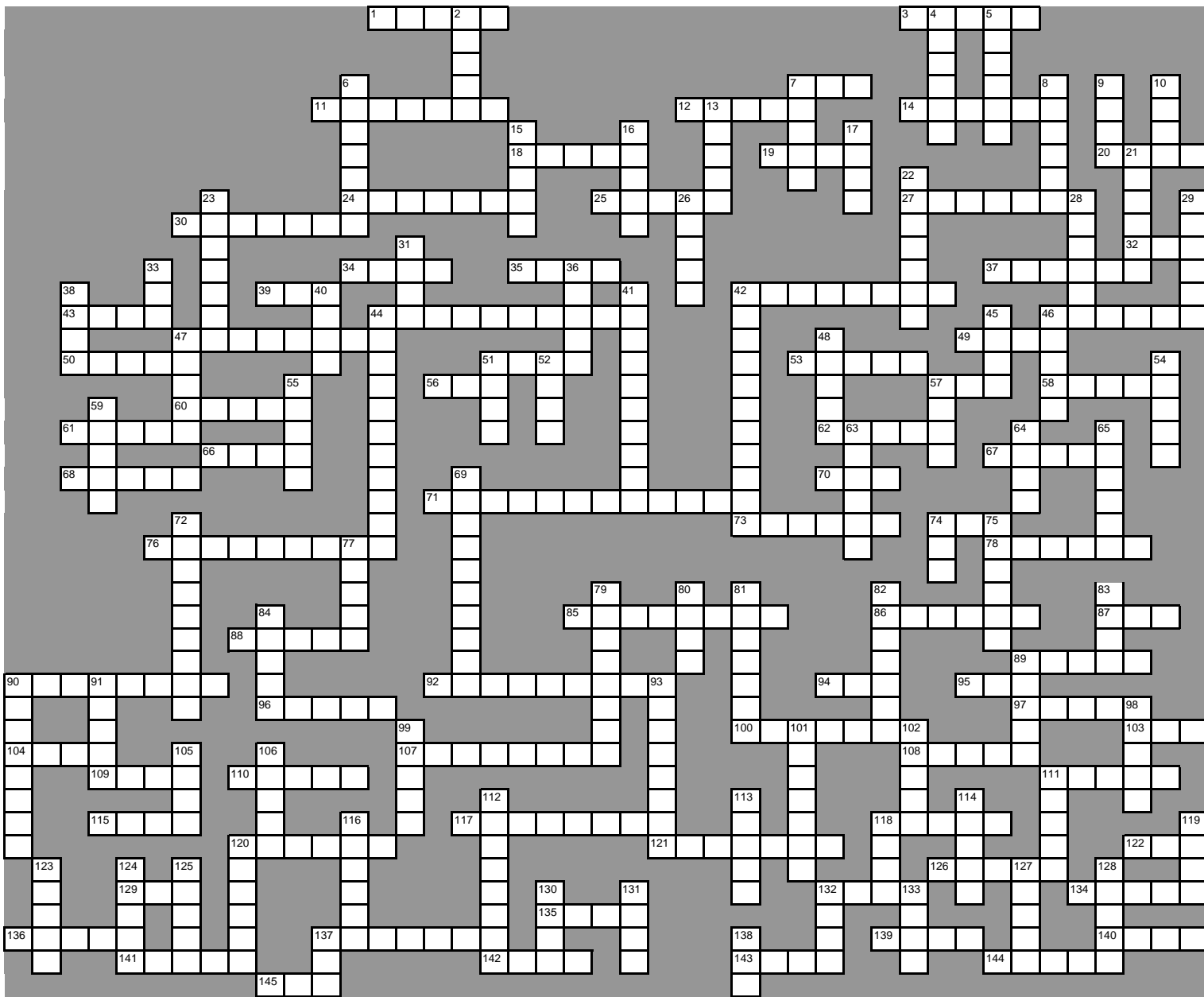
Clues can be disseminated in a number of ways. Depending on how long the contest will last, they can be divided up so that a portion of the clues are announced each day. The first person or team to find the correct responses will then be allowed to inscribe their answers on the wall-size puzzle. These groups of clues can be printed and given out as handouts, announced over the school loudspeaker, or even published in the school newspaper.

Prizes can be awarded for the individual or team who gets the most correct answers or who completes the entire puzzle correctly.

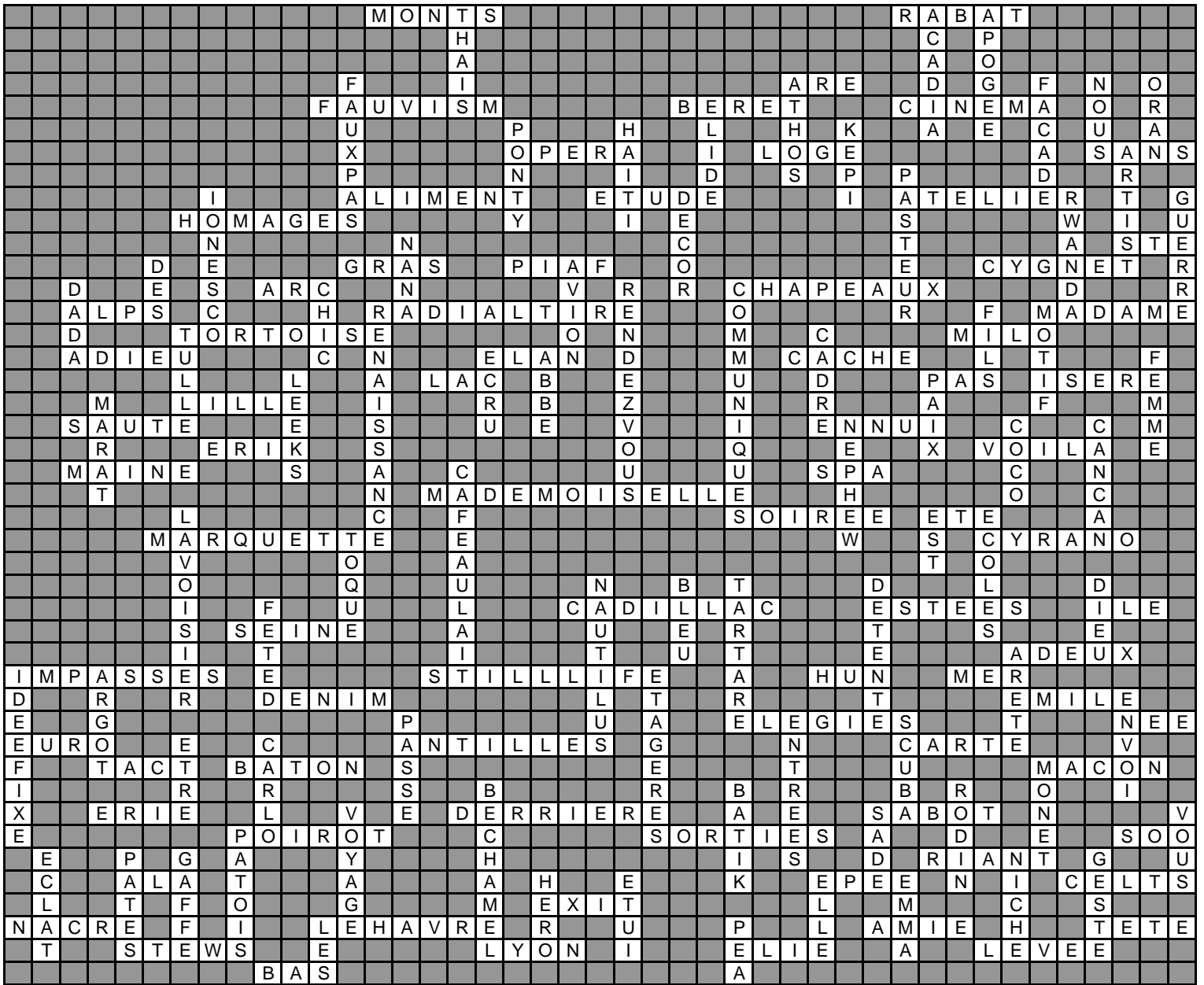
